RING-NECKED PARAKEET

A fairly recent arrival to the UK, this green parrot is now a familiar sight in London and the South East.



JAY

The jay is renowned for its love of acorns, with a single jay able to cache as many as 2,000 acorns in autumn.



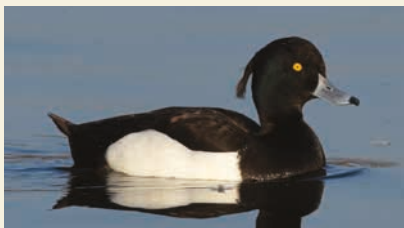
BLUE TIT

An acrobatic little bird often found searching for caterpillars on branches or dangling from buildings to find spiders.



REED WARBLER

Nests in reedbeds to catch moth caterpillars and other insects for its young; listen out for its beautiful song in summer.



TUFTED DUCK

Males are black and white, and females brown. In the winter they come from as far away as Russia.



REDWING

They're most often seen over winter when around 700,000 birds migrate from northern Europe, taking advantage of the berry laden trees and hedgerows in the UK.



MAGPIE

A common bird throughout the UK, magpies are often associated with good luck in UK folklore.



WREN

Weighing under 10g, wrens dart among the undergrowth in search of insects, spiders, seeds and berries. Populations are increasing in the UK.
