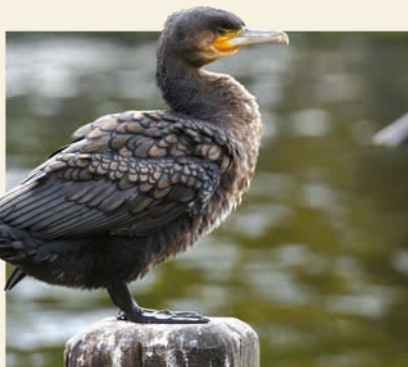


BIRDS TO SPOT IN HYDE PARK



CORMORANT

Fantastic swimmers - watch them dive to hunt for fish and guess where they might pop up again!



GREAT CRESTED GREBE

Once almost hunted to extinction in the UK for the beautiful feathers on its head.



LITTLE OWL

Little owls live in monogamous pairs and are highly territorial. Populations are declining across the UK, due to habitat loss and reductions in insect prey associated with pesticide use.



MUTE SWAN

One of our most elegant birds, it is called 'mute' because it is less vocal than other species of swan.



GREY HERON

Hunts by standing absolutely still or slowly stalking in shallow water, before stabbing its long sharp beak to catch prey.



MALLARD DUCK

Like many species of waterfowl, mallards rely on swallowed grit to assist them in digesting their food. Though it may be common in the UK, feeding ducks and other wildlife causes harm to them and their habitat.



MOORHEN

Its red and yellow beak differentiates this bird from the coot which has a white beak and forehead.



JACKDAW

In the winter, jackdaws congregate to roost, forming large groups or 'rooks' in trees.
