

## Scattering Ashes in The Royal Parks

### Policy Statement

Many people whose relatives have enjoyed visiting a Royal Park ask if their ashes can be scattered in the park after their deaths.

These ashes contain minerals in such concentrations that they affect the soil and the plants that grow in the soil. This in turn can affect the wildlife that relies on the plants for food and shelter.

We understand why people wish to scatter ashes; unfortunately, this can damage the places that were so enjoyed. For relatives who wish to maintain a connection with the parks, The Royal Parks offers a number of schemes that can be dedicated to the memory of a loved one, but also help to conserve the parks.
